March is Workplace Eye Wellness Month

Without proper personal protective equipment on the job and adhering to good hygiene procedures, serious eye injuries and illnesses can occur.

- The most common eye injuries result from trauma to the eye or face from wind-blown particles, ejection of chips or slivers from wood or metal, dust in the air or from blunt force trauma. Eye injuries can also result from contact with chemical splashes or from thermal heat / light rays.
- The communication of blood and body fluids from one person to another can transmit diseases such as the flu, HIV, hepatitis B, and other viral infections. Transfer can occur from a contaminated finger, droplet, or in some cases aerosolized particle.
- Workplace eye injuries are typically a result of worker contact with solid objects, liquids or gases that result in contact, scrapes, blunt force, or penetration to the eye(s) and face area.
- A personal protective equipment (PPE) Program Assessment should be conducted to determine the minimal required protection for a specific job. For many industrial jobs, safety glasses, googles, face shields, or full-face respirators are required. OSHA's eye and face protection standard, 29 CFR 1910.133, requires the use of eye and face protection when workers are exposed to eye or face hazards such as flying objects, molten metal, acids or caustics and other harmful liquid chemicals, chemical gases or vapors, or potentially damaging light radiation.
- The American National Standards Institute (ANSI) developed ANSI Z87.1-2015 to establish criteria for the use, testing, marking, choosing, and maintenance of eye protection used to prevent or minimize injuries and illness resulting from eye hazards.
- Work areas or areas of specific hazards should be identified with signage to provide awareness and reminder as to the level of protection required.
