# Safety Spotlight: Member Interview

# Allen Vinyard, CSP, Director, Industrial Safety & Health



#### The April Spotlight, Allen Vinyard

Where did you go to school? I went to Central Missouri State University. I graduated in 1992 with a BS in Safety Management.

**How long have you been in the safety industry?** About 30 years. While I was in college I cut my teeth doing an internship with an Environmental Company working Asbestos Removal projects. After college I began working for the Kansas Department of Human Resources as an Industrial Hygienist. Since that time I have worked as the Safety Director for the Kansas Department of Transportation, Safety Director of Hamm Inc., then Safety Consultant and now the Director of the Industrial Safety and Health Unit for Kansas Department of Labor.

**How long have you been in your current position**? I have been in my current position since August of 2020. I took over during the middle of this current pandemic. But it has been a rewarding challenge.

What is your current position and from a safety standpoint, what are your primary responsibilities . I am responsible for Supervising the three groups that make up Industrial Safety and Health.

- 1. The OSHA 21(d) Consultation program that provides free safety consultations to employers under 250 employees on-site.
- 2. The Public Sector Safety and Health, that provides Safety and Health inspections for cities, Counties and School Districts in the State of Kansas.
- 3. The Amusement Ride Unit that audits and permits permanent and temporary amusement rides in the State of Kansas.

What made you decide to go into safety? I started off college with studying Fire Science. But as I took more and more Safety classes, I decided I wanted to go in that direction. I liked the aspect of correcting hazards to protect the worker.

What are some of your memorable experiences or accomplishments related to your time in the safety field? I put off obtaining my ASP/CSP for the longest time. Finally I decided I would go ahead and attempt the ASP. I passed on my first attempt, and it felt like the culmination of years of work. On the flip side of that, I will never forget the first worker fatality I had to investigate. I will never forget the name of Scotty McDonald.

What are some of your hobbies or favorite activities? I am a big fan of Kansas City sports. I have had Sporting KC season tickets since they were the Wiz and playing at Arrowhead. My family splits Chiefs season tickets that we have had since 1986. I also love playing golf badly!

What does your ASSP Membership do for you? My ASSP Membership provides networking opportunities when we are having in-person meetings. It provides ANSI, NFPA, and OSHA updates that are important to our work. Plus the ASSP Conference is a must for any Safety or Health person.

#### To Remember Those We've Lost, Pledge to Work Safely

Workplace fatalities are unacceptable. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics data, total U.S. workplace fatalities reached 5,333 in 2019-the highest number of workplace deaths since 2007. Preventable work deaths, meanwhile, continue an upward trend increasing from 4,493 in 2018 to 4,572 in 2019.

Safety is everyone's responsibility. Employers must provide a safe work environment, as well as the financial support, management oversight, PPE, tools and training workers need to do their jobs safely. Both management and workers need to do their part to make safety a <u>personal</u> priority.

Together, these elements are part of a greater safety management system-one which aims to continuously identify hazards and reduce risks to an acceptable level, thus lessening the likelihood of an incident occurring on the job. This system is particularly important as employees return to traditional work environments and schedules in a post-quarantine world.

- Actively look for hazards, promptly report them and take appropriate action to warn others.
